Ancient Greece Timeline

776 BC – The first
Olympic games take
place in honour of Greece

600 BC – The first Greek coins are used to buy and sell goods 570 BC – Pythagoras is born. He made major breakthroughs in science and maths 508 BC- Democracy begins in Athens, giving greater power to the people 432 BC – The Parthenon, the most famous building in Athens, is completed

400-300 BC – Socrates, Plato and Aristotle live, advancing learning 336 BC- Alexander the Great is King and completes many conquests

146 BC — Rome conquers Greece, making it a part of the Roman Empire.
